A MESSAGE from Pastor Maggard

Dear Saints of Grace.

Advent and Christmas are upon us already! I speak of Advent as "penitential." We rightly think of Lent as penitential where we feel sorrow over our sin that drove our Lord to the cross. Traditionally, Lent is accompanied with prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Generally, it seems that most of us skip right past Advent and focus on Christmas. But Advent, in itself, is worthy of focusing on as well. And it is penitential.

Advent is the expectant waiting for the coming of our Lord. It culminates in the first coming of our Lord in the manger. This obviously fills us with great joy. It is staggering to think that the creator and Lord of the universe took on our frail human flesh so that He could join us in our frailty and suffering. Christ the LORD has become Christ our brother! This is one of the greatest mysteries of the church. And it fills us with much joy that Jesus is our brother. But Jesus is so much more than our brother. He is the ruler of all creation. And He is coming again to judge both the living and the dead.

Advent is also expectant waiting for the second coming of our Lord at the end of time. He is coming in all His glory. This glory terrifies us because we are still sinners. To be sure, we are baptized, washed clean of all our sins, and have already inherited eternal life, but we still have that pesky, irritating old man still hanging around our neck. And

that rightly brings some amount of fear at the thought of our Lord returning in all His glory. On this side of glory, there is always the tension of love and fear. I love how C.S. Lewis expresses this idea in "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe:"

"Aslan is a lion- the Lion, the great Lion." "Ooh" said Susan. "I'd thought he was a man. Is he-quite safe? I shall feel rather nervous about meeting a lion"..."Safe?" said Mr Beaver ..."Who said anything about safe? 'Course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the King, I tell you."

Of course, Aslan is C.S. Lewis' allegory for Jesus. He makes a great point that Jesus is not safe, but He's good! This should cause us to meditate on the danger that our sin causes us. And the church has traditionally considered Advent penitential as well as Lent, even if it is not as strong a penitential season as Lent. The joy of Easter is typically stronger than the joy of Christmas. And the penitence of Lent is typically stronger than the penitence of Advent. And this is good. Traditionally, it is still okay to set aside time for prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during this season as well.

We, of course, have freedom with regard to colors used in the church. I like purple in Advent to remind us that Advent and Lent are tied together. Blue is also a fine color and from time to time we will use

blue instead of purple. Blue seems to reflect the royal return of our Lord in His glory. And this is good as well.

Spend some time this Advent meditating on the danger of sin and the wonder of our Lord coming in the flesh to defeat sin, death, and the devil for our benefit. It seems there is very little time for reflection anymore. Advent is a great time to add some distraction-free meditation on the goodness of our Lord.

May God bless you richly these Advent and Christmas seasons.

Christmas Time!


What is your favorite Christmas hymn? There are so many, that I would have a hard time just picking one.
